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	<p>9.2 Environmental sub-committee</p> <p>Cllr. Graham asked if we should purchase more Yellow Rattle for the green by the obelisk. The Chair asked if we could wait and see how the existing plants fair in the spring and make call on new plugs in May.</p>

<p>11.</p>	<p>Edgehill considerations</p> <p>11.1 Speed control options</p> <p>Clerk had a discussion with a Tysoe Cllr who has some experience. In summary, there are a few options:</p> <p>20mph speed limit unlikely to be supported by WCC Highways. If they do agree then likely to be approx. £20k. Unlikely to be effective on its own – if people are ignoring 30 mph then they are also likely to ignore 20mph. Highways Community Action Fund may be able to provide some financial support, on a matched basis.</p> <p>Traffic calming ('raised table' preferred – likely to be £15 - £20k (lighting not usually required). Again WCC approval is required.</p> <p>Starting point is usually a WCC Highways speed survey. RUPC to choose location of speed traps. Request the 'grey box' radar type which are generally more effective than the two-tape type. – Cost approx. £600. 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Appendix I – District Councillor Report

Ward member Report to Parish Councils in Tysoe Ward.

November 2025

1. Planning

As I reported last month, following the Borden Hill Appeal determination, the current situation is that the District Council is now deemed to have only a 2.74 Year Housing Land Supply (5YHLS).

The consequence of the decision is that the Core Strategy is now considered “out of Date” because it relied on the assumption that there was a 5YHLS and policies were made with this in mind; that is clearly no longer the case. This means that valid planning documents made after the date of the introduction of the Core Strategy will carry weight in the ‘Tilted Planning Balance’. (see NPPF paragraph 11)

The standing of current Neighbourhood Plans remains if “made” NDP’s are no older than five years from any application. Planning arguments now must be related to the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) December 2024 as amended February 2025.

Following the decision by Central Government to cease the funding of NDP’s, I introduced a motion at the last Full Council meeting on the 13th of October to fund NDP update and renewal. NDP’s need to reflect the NPPF, [National Planning Policy Framework - GOV.UK](https://www.gov.uk/government/policies/national-planning-policy-framework).

As I understand it, NDP’s may be up-dated and policies revised in-line with the current NPPF by reverting to Regulation 17 which should mean minimal work. It would be wise to draw any redraft of policies in line with the emerging South Warwickshire Local Plan (SWLP) which is currently at Regulation 18 and expected to move to Regulation 19 in the Spring of 2026. Regrettably this represents a slippage of some months.

The emerging South Warwickshire Local Plan (SWLP) objectives reflect the current NPPF. Alongside the SWLP is the South Warwickshire Economic Growth Plan. Inappropriate planning applications that would not meet the:

- Economic Objectives,
- Social Objectives,
- Environmental Objectives,

will be resisted.

The implication of this is that housing applications will be more likely to be granted planning permission unless there are significant and demonstrable factors that outweigh the benefits of the development. This will be the situation until the 5 Year Land Supply is re-established. The ‘bar’ however has been raised and reason to refuse permission must be able to show “Substantial Harm” including in the Greenbelt.

It has been announced that a new definition of “Greybelt” has been introduced to open development within the Greenbelt of poor-quality agricultural land. We do not have any Greenbelt in this Ward and Areas of National Landscape such as the Cotswold are exempt from this classification.

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2. Local Government Reform and Devolution

In December 2024 the Government announced the abolition of two-tier local Government; that is, County, Borough, and District Councils in favour of Unitary Authorities. Please note that Town and Parish Councils are not part of this reform although there may be some consequences.

The overall object for Government is that all Local Authorities in England will be formed into Mayoral Strategic Authorities (MSA). MSA's will have devolved powers and funding. It should be noted that Warwickshire County Council (WCC) has already been given some devolved powers under the previous government's legislation in 2024.

An MSA, must be comprised of more than one Unitary Authority (UA). A UA combines the responsibilities of both tiers of local government. In Warwickshire's case the County Council and three Borough and two District Councils. Only District Councils have Town and Parish Councils.

The options open to Warwickshire are to:

- Create a single Unitary Authority which would require Joining with the West Midlands Combined Authority.
- Create a two Unitary Authority, North Warwickshire combining North Warwickshire, Nuneaton & Bedworth, and Rugby Borough Councils, and South Warwickshire consisting of both Stratford on Avon District and Warwick District Councils. As two UA's these could come under the umbrella of a Majoral Warwickshire Strategic Authority maintaining the boundaries of what we recognise as 'Warwickshire' today.

All the existing Councils have worked together and commissioned studies from various consultants to determine the most effective solution for residents against the Government criteria. The overall report from Deloitte combined the results of the following other consultants:

- Opinion Research Services - engagement survey,
- Peopletoo – Adult Social Care and Children Services Analysis,
- DCN (District Council Network)- analysis of existing unitary councils: bigger isn't better,

Additional comments were sort from:

- NHS Coventry and Warwickshire Integrated Care board,
- WCC fire and Rescue Service, and
- Warwickshire P&CC.

The overall conclusion by Deloitte is shown in the table below.

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Ward member Report to Parish Councils in Tysoe Ward.

December 2025

First, I wish everyone a Merry Christmas and Peaceful, Prosperous, and Happy New Year.

This year has been one of working towards forthcoming change. Change to local government authority and responsibilities and change to the planning rules and vulnerability caused by SDC being currently unable to demonstrate a five-year housing land supply and change in the way local government is organised is scheduled for April 2028.

As a member of the opposition, we have been working to support the administration where we have agreed, proposed policies to encourage an increase in retail footfall, and have introduced budget proposals to increase the number of EV Charge points, install PV canopies in carparks, and reduce the cost of Green Bins and carparking costs for SDC Council Tax Payers.

I also introduced a motion supported by Cllr. Anne Parry to provide £250,000 in the budget for 2026/27 for Parish Councils to renew or establish a Neighbourhood Development Plan which received unanimous support at the Full Council Meeting on the 10th of December. NDP's have a lifetime and only have weight in determining planning Applications if they have been "made" five years or less prior to the date of the planning application. Many of the around 30 made NDP's in the District are older than that. This fund replaces the financial support that was cancelled this autumn by the current government at the same time as increasing the quota of housing to be carried by the District.

My goal, and that of my colleagues is to make a difference in our Wards for all residents and to act as advocates on their behalf. Change is coming in the form of Local Government reform that will in 2028 create a single tier of Local Government. This will consolidate all the responsibilities of Local Government into a single Authority and will mean that your local Councillors will be more able to influence the authority on your behalf whilst maintaining your access to your representatives.

Until a Five-Year Housing Land Supply (5YHLS) is re-established or the South Warwickshire Local Plan made, there are going to be difficult decisions to make in the coming year. Between the beginning of 2025 and the end of 2050, South Warwickshire is required by central government to build some 30,000 houses in the combined SDC & WDC geography. This will be a challenge because of economic factors, commercial imperatives, and constraints on suitable sites. Whilst the 5YHLS is not in place, the planning balance is tilted towards granting developments. This does not mean that Developers have carte blanche to do what they want. Protection is still there in the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF), in up-to-date (less than five years old) local NDP's and less so in Parish Plans, and Local Housing Needs Surveys. I hope the NDP fund that I referred to above will assist with ensuring these plans are updated or established.

Consequently, there is much still to be done in the next remaining months to local elections in May 2027 when a 'shadow' Unitary Authority will be created that will take control when the UA is vested in April 2028.

Finally, I hope that everyone has a great holiday period with friends and family. I will be doing just that but of course remain available throughout as always
